HOLY COMMUNION

As Christians who believe that the Bible is inspired by God and that every word written in it is God's holy word, we believe that we receive the body and blood in, with, and under the bread and wine. While this is something that goes beyond our human understanding, our faith allows us to accept this as true. God warns us in the Bible that anyone who doesn't understand this teaching or who denies this real presence of Christ's body and blood will do damage to his or her soul if not properly taught first (1 Corinthians 11:27-29).

As a congregation we care about people and about the spiritual well-being of individuals, especially those attending the Lord's Table today. If you are a guest and desire to commune, please speak to the pastor before the service. Our altar is open to those who confess oneness with us in doctrine, are not under church discipline in another congregation, and are members of our congregation, one of our sister congregations in the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod [WELS], or a member of our sister synod, the Evangelical Lutheran Synod [ELS].

WORSHIP THEME

This Lent, we will use the metaphor of eyesight to examine how the various people in Mark's Gospel viewed Jesus during his Passion. In most cases, they misunderstood who he was and what he was doing; then again, sometimes by faith people did recognize him correctly.

We have these forty days of Lent in which we may look within ourselves as people of faith in our day. How are we like or unlike the people who saw Jesus in the flesh? Most important, as we gather for worship, we will see what Jesus has done to save us from our sins by his holy precious blood and innocent suffering and death.

Today, we consider the disciples. They failed to see that Jesus had to leave them so he could die and rise for them and for us. And they misjudged the selfless, loving act of the woman who anointed Jesus with expensive perfume. He saw it as a beautiful, selfless act of adoration that prepared him for his burial. We need to examine ourselves, lest we seek public approval or divine reward for our deeds. Only what our Lord has done for us makes us please to the Father.

ASH WEDNESDAY

M: Brothers and sisters in Christ, God created us to know joy in communion with him, to love all humanity, and to live in harmony with all creation. But sin separates us from God, our neighbors, and creation, and so we do not enjoy the life our Creator intended for us. By our sin we grieve our Father, who does not desire us to come under his judgment but to turn to him and live. Therefore, God in his mercy has sent our Lord Jesus Christ to take our place under the law, to suffer for us, and to die the death we deserve. God made Jesus, who had no sin, to be sin for us so that in him, we might become the righteousness of God.

During the 40 days of Lent, we fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of God. The time of Lent reminds us that to know Christ and the power of his resurrection, we must also know the fellowship of sharing in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death. As disciples of the Lord Jesus, we are called to struggle against everything that leads us away from love of God and neighbor. I invite you, therefore, to confess your sins, ask our Father for forgiveness, and commit yourselves to this struggle. Let us be silent. Let us be still. Let us pause now for a time of reflection and self-examination.

IMPOSITION OF ASHES

The practice of the imposition of ashes has been used in the church since the first century. The church father, Tertullian (c. a.d. 160–215), writes of the use of ashes as a public expression of repentance and of our human frailty that stands in need of Christ. The ashes remind us of our need for redeeming grace as they recall the words from the rite for Christian burial: "...earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust...," words that will very likely be spoken over us all HYMN

THE WORD

FIRST LESSON

Joel 2:12-19

Joel has shown us a locust plague that came upon Israel, followed by another catastrophe when another army of locust like attackers invades the land. So what is Israel to do? When judgment is coming, there is only one thing to do; and it doesn't involve guns, gold, or groceries. Repent.

¹²Even now this is the LORD's declaration turn to me with all your heart, with fasting, weeping, and mourning. ¹³Tear your hearts, not just your clothes, and return to the LORD your God. For he is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger, abounding in faithful love, and he relents from sending disaster. ¹⁴Who knows? He may turn and relent and leave a blessing behind him, so you can offer a grain offering and a drink offering to the LORD your God. ¹⁵Blow the ram's horn in Zion! Announce a sacred fast; proclaim a solemn assembly. ¹⁶ Gather the people; sanctify the congregation; assemble the aged;^[a] gather the infants, even babies nursing at the breast. Let the groom leave his bedroom, and the bride her honeymoon chamber. ¹⁷Let the priests, the LORD's ministers, weep between the portico and the altar. Let them say, "Have pity on your people, LORD, and do not make your inheritance a disgrace, an object of scorn among the nations.

Why should it be said among the peoples, 'Where is their God?'''

Look, I am about to send you

SECOND LESSON

Peter encourages us to make every effort to remain connected to Christ.

²May grace and peace be multiplied to you through the knowledge of God and of Jesus our Lord.

³His^{III} divine power has given us everything required for life and godliness through the knowledge of him who called us by^{III} his own glory and goodness. ⁴ By these he has given us very great and precious promises, so that through them you may share in the divine nature, escaping the corruption that is in the world because of evil desire. ⁵ For this very reason, make every effort to supplement your faith with goodness, goodness with knowledge, ⁶ knowledge with self-control, self-control with endurance, endurance with godliness, ⁷ godliness with brotherly affection, and brotherly affection with love. ⁸ For if you possess these qualities in increasing measure, they will keep you from being useless or unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁹ The person who lacks these things is blind and shortsighted and has forgotten the cleansing from his past sins. ¹⁰ Therefore, brothers and sisters, make every effort to confirm your calling and election, because if you do these things you will never stumble. ¹¹ For in this way, entry into the eternal kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ will be richly provided for you.

Then why put Ashes, a symbol of our piety on our face? The intent of the imposition is not to showcase our piety but our mortality. It demonstrates the reality of our condition; we will die but it also shows how faithful our God is.



6 "Be careful not to practice your righteousness^{III} in front of others to be seen by them. Otherwise, you have no reward with your Father in heaven. ²So whenever you give to the poor, don't sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and on the streets, to be applauded by people. Truly I tell you, they have

¹⁶ "Whenever you fast, don't be gloomy like the hypocrites. For they disfigure their faces so that their fasting is obvious to people. Truly I tell you, they have their reward. ¹⁷ But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, ¹⁸ so that your fasting isn't obvious to others but to your Father who is in secret. And your Father who sees in secret will reward you.^[4]

¹⁹ "Don't store up for yourselves treasures¹⁰ on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal. ²⁰ But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys, and where thieves don't break in and steal. ²¹ For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

PASSION READING

It was two days before the Passover and the Festival of Unleavened Bread. The chief priests and the scribes were looking for a cunning way to arrest Jesus and kill him. ²"Not during the festival," they said, "so that there won't be a riot among the people."

³While he was in Bethany at the house of Simon the leper,^{III} as he was reclining at the table, a woman came with an alabaster jar of very expensive perfume of pure nard. She broke the jar and poured it on his head. ⁴But some were expressing indignation to one another: "Why has this perfume been wasted? ⁵For this perfume might have been sold for more than three hundred denarii^{III} and given to the poor." And they began to scold her.

⁶Jesus replied, "Leave her alone. Why are you bothering her? PREFACE

As the congregation exits the church this evening, those who received the imposition of ashes today are invited to use the water of the font to wash the ashes away. Those who do not have ash to remove are encouraged to dip their hand in the font and make the sign of the cross over themselves. This action (for those with or without ashes) is a good reminder as we embark on this penitential season that baptism has removed the filth of sin fom us, and that we have been "marked on the head and on the heart as redeemed children of God." May you be reminded of your baptismal grace every day! Peace be to you!
