THE SEASON OF END TIME



CONFESSION OF SINS

The Reformation never sought to abolish Private Confession and Absolution; as the Augsburg Confession says, "Private Absolution ought to be retained in the Churches." However, in addition to Private Confession, General Confession before the Sacrament developed as a way to further prepare oneself for the reception of Christ's Body and Blood.


M: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

C: Amen.

- M: Beloved in the Lord: let us draw near with a true heart and confess our sins to God our Father, asking him in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ to grant us forgiveness.
- C: Holy and merciful Father, I confess that I am by nature sinful and that I have disobeyed you in my thoughts, words, and actions. I have done what is evil and failed to do what is good. For this I deserve your punishment both now and in eternity. But I am truly sorry for my sins, and trusting in my Savior Jesus Christ, I pray: Lord, have mercy on me, a sinner.

LORD, HAVE MERCY – Kyrie

"Kyrie eleison" means, "Lord, have mercy." In the **Kyrie** we come before God with the prayer that was on the lips of Blind Bartimaeus. We approach our merciful Savior as citizens of heaven, seeking His mercy for our salvation, the peace of the whole world, the well-being of His church, our worship, and our everlasting defense (Mark 10:49).




- M: God, our heavenly Father, has been merciful to us and has given his only Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Therefore, as a called servant of Christ and by his authority, I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.
- C: Amen.
- M: In the peace of forgiveness, let us praise the Lord.

GLORY TO GOD – Gloria in Excelsis

The Glory to God is an amplification of the glorious message of the angels on the plains of Bethlehem. This message the Christian Church has always treasured. It is said, for instance, that a form of the Gloria was the usual morning song of the early Christians in the days of persecution, when the mere singing of it might well have brought martyrdom in its wake and ofen did

M: Let us pray.



FIRST LESSON Revelation 14:6–7

An angel proclaims the eternal gospel. God's Word will endure no matter who or what stands against it.

⁶Then I saw another angel flying high overhead, with the eternal gospel to announce to the inhabitants of the earth—to every nation, tribe, language, and people. ⁷He spoke with a loud voice: "Fear God and give him glory, because the hour of his judgment has come. Worship the one who made heaven and earth, the sea and the springs of water."





God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble.

Therefore we will not fear, though the <u>earth</u> give way and the mountains fall into the heart of the sea,

though its waters <u>roar</u> and foam and the mountains quake with their <u>surg</u>ing.

SECOND LESSON Romans 3:19–28

In Paul's letter to the Romans, he writes of both Law and Gospel. He writes of God's anger against sin and God's righteousness given through Jesus. Here, at this transitional point, is the promise of Jesus' righteousness and the freedom he brings. Yes, freedom from sin and freedom to live in all righteousness comes to us who live by faith. We have been declared innocent, and no law will shackle us again. Now we live for him who has set us free.

¹⁹ Now we know that whatever the law says, it speaks to those who are subject to the law, ^[a] so that every mouth may be shut and the whole world may become subject to God's judgment. ^[b] For no one will be justified ^[c] in his sight by the works of the law, because the knowledge of sin comes through the law.

²¹ But now, apart from the law, the righteousness of God has been revealed, attested by the Law and the Prophets. [4] ²² The righteousness of God is through faith in Jesus Christ [5] to all who believe, since there is no distinction. ²³ For all have sinned and fall short of the [6] glory of God; ²⁴ they are justified freely by his grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus. ²⁵ God presented him as the mercy seat [6] by his blood, through faith, to demonstrate his righteousness, because in his restraint God passed over the sins previously committed. ²⁶ God presented him to demonstrate his righteousness at the present time, so that he would be just and justify the one who has faith in Jesus.

²⁷Where, then, is boasting? It is excluded. By what kind of law?^[1] By one of works? No, on the contrary, by a law^[] of faith. ²⁸ For we conclude that a person is justified by faith apart from the works of the law.

VERSE OF THE DAY

John 8:31, 32

Alleluia. If you continue in my Word, you are truly my disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free. Alleluia.

GOSPEL John 8:31–36

Within true discipleship comes the understanding and knowledge of the true mystery of Christ. With this knowledge comes freedom.

M: The Gospel according to John, chapter 8.



³¹Then Jesus said to the Jews who had believed him, "If you continue in my word, ^[a] you really are my disciples. ³²You will know the truth, and the truth will set you free."

³³ "We are descendants^[b] of Abraham," they answered him, "and we have never been enslaved to anyone. How can you say, 'You will become free'?"

³⁴ Jesus responded, "Truly I tell you, everyone who commits sin is a slave of sin. ³⁵ A slave does not remain in the household forever, but a son does remain forever. ³⁶ So if the Son sets you free, you really will be free.

After the reading of the Gospel, the Minister will say:





certain when Martin Luther wrote this hymn. Some believe it may date fom 1527 or 1528, while others consider it to have been inspired by the Diet of Speyer, where, on April 20, 1529, the German princes made their formal "protest" against the revocation of their liberties and thus gained the name "Protestants." Based on Psalm 46, this hymn brought great comfort, courage, and strength to Luther and his followers during times of trial and persecution. The hymn spread rapidly throughout Germany and was sung at the Diet of Augsburg in 1530. Gustavus Adolphus and his army sang this hymn before the Battle of Leipzig in 1631, and the Salzburg Emigrants adopted it as their traveling hymn in 1732

CREATE IN ME

PRAYER OF THE CHURCH

M: Eternal Lord, you speak to us in words of truth. Fill us with peace as we ponder the good news that you forgive our sins in Christ. Guide our lives. Work in us through your Spirit that our thoughts, words, and actions glorify you and serve our neighbor.

- C: Give us thankful hearts to live and love with joy.
- M: Guard and guide us as we live in a society that despises what you say about marriage. Lead husbands and wives to love each other with commitment, respect, and patience. Move parents to grasp the eternal value of keeping their children close to Jesus even when their children grow up.
- C: Protect us from the evil that surrounds us; give us pure hearts and minds.
- M: Provide your divine compass for those who govern us by making laws and setting policies. Give us respect for those who protect us from crime and aggression. Lead us to value the rights of our fellow citizens and to care for those who cannot care for themselves.
- C: Bless our land with peace and prosperity so that the gospel may be proclaimed to all.
- M: Give us passion to share the story of your love with our family and friends. Overcome unbelief and open the hearts of people everywhere to believe the good news that Jesus has forgiven their sins and opened the gates of heaven.
- C: Fill us with joy over every sinner who repents and comes to trust in your grace.
- M: Extend your healing power to those who are sick and suffering in body or mind. Fill eager minds with wisdom to discover new ways to treat disease and illness. Give patience and compassion to those who care for the sick and dying.
- C: Lift the eyes of the dying to your love in Christ.
- M: Hear us, Lord, as we bring you our private petitions. Silent prayer.

M: Let us give thanks to the Lord, our God.


C: It is good and right so to do.

Therefore, with all the saints on earth and hosts of heaven, we praise your holy name and join their glorious song:

HOLY, HOLY, HOLY – Sanctus

Sanctus means "holy". The body and blood of our Lord are present in this sacrament, and so we use the words of the angels from Isaiah 6 to acknowledge the holy presence of God in this meal





WORDS OF INSTITUTION

M: Our Lord Jesus Christ, on the night he was betrayed, took bread; and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take and eat; this is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

Then he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is poured out for you for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me."

M: The peace of the Lord be with you always.


DISTRIBUTION
