"Morning Praise" is based on the historic service called "Matins". Joined to Christ, our risen Lord, we glorify God as we prepare for the activities of the day.



FIRST LESSON

Lamentations 3:22-33

Much of human suffering is the direct result of sin—including the sins of others. So Jeremiah endures the loss of everything because of the rebellion and stubborn unbelief of his countrymen. They have nothing, now, but death, and those still living nothing but shame, misery, and despair. But Jeremiah recognized that, regardless of the sin that caused the misery, suffering to the point of death as a salutary benefit of focusing the Christian's attention on what really matters. And what matters is God's grace and the sustaining promise of His abiding presence and unfailing love, expressed in the Gospel of redeeming us sinners by the blood of His own eternal Son.

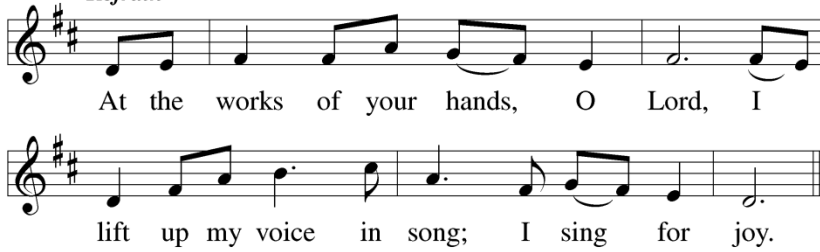

SECOND LESSON

2 Corinthians 8:1-9, 13-15

Because of God's care for us, we give joyfully to share in the work of helping God's people.

⁸ We want you to know, brothers and sisters, about the grace of God that was given to the churches of Macedonia: ² During a severe trial brought about by affliction, their abundant joy and their extreme poverty overflowed in a wealth of generosity on their part. ³ I can testify that, according to their ability and even beyond their ability, of their own accord, ⁴ they begged us earnestly for the privilege of sharing in the ministry to the saints, ⁵ and not just as we had hoped. Instead, they gave themselves first to the Lord and then to us by God's will. ⁶ So we urged Titus that just as he had begun, so he should also complete among you this act of grace.

⁷ Now as you excel in everything—in faith, speech, knowledge, and in all diligence, and in your love for us^[a]—excel also in this act of grace. ⁸ I am not saying this as a command. Rather, by means of the diligence of others, I am testing the genuineness of your love. ⁹ For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ: Though he was rich, for your sake he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich.

¹³ It is not that there should be relief for others and hardship for you, but it is a question of equality.^[a] ¹⁴ At the present time your surplus is available for their need, so that their abundance may in turn meet your need, in order that there may be equality. ¹⁵ As it is written: **The person who had much did not have too much, and the person who had little did not have too little.**^[a]

THE GOSPEL

Mark 5:21-43

What care Jesus shows! Even in the face of death, God's care for us does not fail. When everyone else tells him that there is no further point in bothering Jesus because the child has died, Jesus encourages Jairus with the words, "Only believe!" But believe what? Jesus hadn't promised to raise the child. Yet, His going with Jairus was the unspoken promise of help. In the face of death Jairus trusted the promise, even when he could not know exactly what form the fulfillment of the promise would take. That's our trust, too, when disaster, even death, approaches. We take refuge in the promise of Jesus to go with us, even if it means a journey to the cemetery.

²¹ When Jesus had crossed over again by boat^[a] to the other side, a large crowd gathered around him while he was by the sea. ²² One of the synagogue leaders, named Jairus, came, and when he saw Jesus, he fell at his feet ²³ and begged him earnestly, "My little daughter is dying. Come and lay your hands on her so that she can

get well²⁴ and live.”²⁴ So Jesus went with him, and a large crowd was following and pressing against him.

²⁵ Now a woman suffering from bleeding for twelve years²⁶ had endured much under many doctors. She had spent everything she had and was not helped at all. On the contrary, she became worse.²⁷ Having heard about Jesus, she came up behind him in the crowd and touched his clothing.²⁸ For she said, “If I just touch his clothes, I’ll be made well.”²⁹ Instantly her flow of blood ceased, and she sensed in her body that she was healed of her affliction.

³⁰ Immediately Jesus realized that power had gone out from him. He turned around in the crowd and said, “Who touched my clothes?”

³¹ His disciples said to him, “You see the crowd pressing against you, and yet you say, ‘Who touched me?’”

³² But he was looking around to see who had done this.³³ The woman, with fear and trembling, knowing what had happened to her, came and fell down before him, and told him the whole truth.³⁴ “Daughter,” he said to her, “your faith has saved you. Go in peace and be healed from your affliction.”

³⁵ While he was still speaking, people came from the synagogue leader’s house and said, “Your daughter is dead. Why bother the teacher anymore?”

³⁶ When Jesus overheard³⁷ what was said, he told the synagogue leader, “Don’t be afraid. Only believe.”³⁷ He did not let anyone accompany him except Peter, James, and John, James’s brother.³⁸ They came to the leader’s house, and he saw a commotion—people weeping and wailing loudly.³⁹ He went in and said to them, “Why are you making a commotion and weeping? The child is not dead but asleep.”⁴⁰ They laughed at him, but he put them all outside. He took the child’s father, mother, and those who were with him, and entered the place where the child was.⁴¹ Then he took the child by the hand and said to her, “Talitha kum”⁴² (which is translated, “Little girl, I say to you, get up”).⁴² Immediately the girl got up and began to walk. (She was twelve years old.) At this they were utterly astounded.⁴³ Then he gave them strict orders that no one should know about this and told them to give her something to eat.
