WORSHIP THEME

Lent began with an almost equal focus on the sinner and the Savior. But increasingly and now in Holy Week the focus is on Christ. The readings for today want us to understand once and for all who it really is who has come to save us, so that with all confidence we may do as the Prayer for the Day suggests, follow him from Holy Week to Easter, from earth to heaven.

Our King willingly comes to set us free by His Passion! With joy we meet him. With palms we praise him. We join the procession to honor and welcome the Conqueror over death and hell as he proceeds to the battlefield. Zechariah foresaw this (Traditional First Lesson — Zechariah 9:9,10). The joy is great for we know the cross leads to Easter. This is more than reenactment. We presently accompany this Victor as he enters his house today to give us this victory. After the procession, we are confronted with his cries from the cross (Introit) and we hear of his Passion (Gospel). This does not surprise us, but rather is the very reason we carry palms: Our victory, of which palms are symbolic, is won by his cross! Today also sets the stage for Holy Week. It's not a week of mourning, but there are notes of joy and victory throughout, a realization that Christ's sacred Passion was the path to Easter glory (Second Lesson). We will not understand this week unless we keep this in mind. That is true even today as we hear of His death, but receive him alive in the Supper.

Palm Sunday - Service of the Word

Those desiring to participate in the procession may gather in the fellowship hall. The Procession with Palms begins in the rear of the church. Pastor will conduct the beginning of the service from the doorway. Please stand.

M: The grace of our Lord 🖶 Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you.

C: And also with you.

M: For the five weeks of Lent we have been preparing for the celebration of our Lord's paschal mystery. Today we come together to begin the solemn celebration of Holy Week. Christ entered in triumph into his own city to complete his work as our Messiah: to suffer, to die, and to rise again. Remember with devotion his entry that culminated at the empty tomb and follow him in faith. United with him in Baptism, we share in his resurrection and new life.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.


C: Hosanna in the highest!

M: Let us pray.

God our Father, we remember how Jesus entered Jerusalem before his passion and was welcomed as king by those who shouted, "Hosanna", and spread their cloaks and palm branches in his path. Accept our words of praise and listen to our prayers as we rejoice in our triumphant King who entered Jerusalem to save us; even your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ.

PROCESSIONAL HYMN All Glory, Land, and											
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Text: Theodulph of Orleans, c. 762–821; tr. John M. Neale, 1818–66, alt. Tune: VALET WILL ICH DIR GEBEN (76 76 D) Melchior Teschner, 1584–1635, alt. "All Glory, Laud, and Honor" was written by Theodulf (c. A.D. 762-821), who served as a poet in the court of Charlemagne. He penned this hymn from a cell in a monastery called Saint-Aubin, having been stripped of his titles and land by Louis the Pious.

Though he lost all access to earthly emperors and courts, there was, however, a greater emperor by far, to whom he could appeal and from whom earthly rulers could never deny him access.

Within four years of the start of his imprisonment, Theodulf died. More than a thousand years later, an English translation of his hymn remains a favorite in the church's Palm Sunday festivities.

M: Let us pray.



FIRST LESSON

Jesus is the King of kings. He comes on a donkey because all of his enemies have been defeated. He comes proclaiming peace. His kingdom extends rules from the river to the ends of the earth

⁹Rejoice greatly, Daughter Zion! Shout in triumph, Daughter Jerusalem! Look, your King is coming to you; he is righteous and victorious,^[a] humble and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey. ¹⁰ I will cut off the chariot from Ephraim and the horse from Jerusalem. The bow of war will be removed, and he will proclaim peace to the nations. His dominion will extend from sea to sea, from the Euphrates River to the ends of the earth. ¹¹As for you, because of the blood of your covenant, I will release your prisoners from the waterless cistern. ¹² Return to a stronghold, you prisoners who have hope; today I declare that I will restore double to you.

PSALM OF THE DAY

The psalmist speaks of the Messiah as one who suffers and is scorned

- M: Be gracious to me, LORD, because I am in distress; my eyes are worn out from frustration my whole being
 as well.
- C: Indeed, my life is consumed with grief and my years with groaning; my strength has failed because of my iniquity,[™] and my bones waste away.
- M: I am ridiculed by all my adversaries and even by my neighbors.

I am dreaded by my acquaintances; those who see me in the street run from me.

- C: I am forgotten: gone from memory like a dead person—like broken pottery.
- M: I have heard the gossip of many; terror is on every side.When they conspired against me, they plotted to take my life.
- C: But I trust in you, LORD; I say, "You are my God."
- M: The course of my life is in your power; rescue me from the power of my enemies and from my persecutors.
- C: Make your face shine on your servant; save me by your faithful love.

SECOND LESSON

Philippians 2:5-11

Jesus is the King of kings who humbled himself to serve. Paul encourages us to follow Jesus' lead by humbly serving others

⁵Adopt the same attitude as that of Christ Jesus, ⁶who, existing in the form of God, did not consider equality with God as something to be exploited. ⁷Instead he emptied himself by assuming the form of a servant, taking on the likeness of humanity. And when he had come as a man, ⁸he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of deatheven to death on a cross. ⁹For this reason God highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, ¹⁰ so that at the name of Jesus every knee will bowin heaven and on earth and under the earth¹¹ and every tongue will confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Humility, arrogance, or both? Jesus certainly is making a statement by riding a donkey. He's claiming to be that the conqueror that Zechariah prophesied. He brings a rule of peace.

11 When they approached Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany near the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples ² and told them, "Go into the village ahead of you. As soon as you enter it, you will find a colt tied there, on which no one has ever sat. Untie it and bring it. ³ If anyone says to you, "Why are you doing this?" say, "The Lord needs it and will send it back here right away.""


⁴So they went and found a colt outside in the street, tied by a door. They untied it, ⁵ and some of those standing there said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" ⁶They answered them just as Jesus had said; so they let them go.

⁷They brought the colt to Jesus and threw their clothes on it, and he sat on it. ⁸Many people spread their clothes on the road, and others spread leafy branches cut from the fields.^{[a] 9}Those who went ahead and those who followed shouted:

Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!^[b] ¹⁰ Blessed is the coming kingdom of our father David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!



"No Tramp of Soldiers' Marching

Feet" is matched to a tune that has both a regal and a marching quality to it, which makes it fitting for Holy Week as we ponder our Lord's kingly procession into Jerusalem without customary regal fanfare. Later this week we will hear the tramping feet of soldiers marching to arrest Jesus and deliver Him to Pontius Pilate.

Each stanza places the words, "Behold, Behold your King," on quite different lips: the humility of Palm Sunday (st. 1), our Lord's Passion (st. 2,3), and the genuine victory procession of our Lord's Resurrection (st. 4).
